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1 Recommendation

- 1.1 That the following details of the urgent actions taken by the Leader of the Council be noted:
 - a) to authorise the Director for Regeneration and Growth to accept the £1,000,000 Transforming Cities Fund (TCF) Grant for the Birchley Island M5 Junction 2 Scheme under the Terms and Conditions contained in the Grant Agreement;
 - b) to authorise the Director of Law and Governance & Monitoring Officer, in consultation with Section 151 officer, to accept the TCF £1,000,000 Transforming Cities Fund (TCF) Grant for the Birchley Island M5 Junction 2 Scheme under the Terms and Conditions contained in the Grant Agreement.



















2 Reasons for Recommendation

- 2.1 The matter was urgent and could not be delayed until the next Cabinet meeting given the need to ensure that the Transforming Cities Fund Grant could be drawn down in this financial year (2021/22) to maintain the funding profile needed to deliver the scheme. The Chair of Economy, Skills, Transport and Environment Scrutiny Board has been consulted.
- 2.2 Under Part 4 of the Council's Constitution, the Scrutiny Procedure Rules provide that matters may not be called in for scrutiny when they are considered urgent. A matter is considered urgent where a delay would prejudice the Council's or the public interest.
- 2.3 The Rules also stipulate that decisions taken in this manner must be reported to the next available meeting of the Cabinet and Council, together with the reasons for the urgency.
- 2.4 This report indicates action taken as a matter of urgency by the Leader of the Council since the last meeting.
- 2.5 The actions taken were in accordance with the scope of authority of the Leader of the Council.

3 How does this deliver objectives of the Corporate Plan?

A strong and inclusive economy

The Birchley Island scheme proposal will lead to a positive effect on Sandwell's connectivity to employment opportunities and labour markets whilst also improving the Black Country's manufacturing access to markets in this key sector. Birchley Island as it currently stands inhibits growth and acts as a key constraint on development planning which is essential for the regeneration and continued prosperity of the borough.



A connected and accessible Sandwell

The Birchley Island Scheme aims to improve the reliability of transport between residential areas and employment, retail and other services on a key element in the Black Country's road network. The key transport objectives will reduce congestion and increase capacity on all approach arms to the Island. The scheme will also reduce journey time delays and improve journey time reliability also making provision for improved walking, cycling and public transport.

4 Context and Key Issues

4.1 The West Midlands Combined Authority will provide up to £1,000,000 of grant funding into the Birchley Island M5 Junction 2 scheme to ensure the funding package for the scheme. This is consistent with the budget request to the Department for Transport (DfT) for Major Road Network funding. The DfT have confirmed Programme Entry for the scheme within the Major Road Network programme as outlined in a letter to Sandwell Metropolitan Borough Council and WMCA dated 1st February 2021. As part of this approval the DfT will provide a maximum capped funding of £24.400,000 towards the Birchley Island scheme on approval of the Full Business Case submission.



















- 4.2 The current junction suffers from significant levels of congestion, not only during peak periods but throughout the day. This impacts negatively upon the competitiveness of the borough, spatial planning choices, sustainable transport provision and air quality. The existing situation is characterised by constant queuing, delays and congestion both on the roundabout and its approaches.
- 4.3 The Impacts of the congestion levels are both local and strategic. Access to the Major Road Network and Strategic Road Network is compromised by the current junction arrangements with traffic diverting to less suitable and longer routes to avoid the junction.
- 4.4 The Birchley Island M5 Junction 2 scheme lies at the intersection with the M5, A4123 and A4034 in Sandwell Metropolitan Borough. These routes connect Birmingham, Blackheath, Dudley, Oldbury, Walsall, West Bromwich and Wolverhampton with each other, as well as linking much of the southern part of the Black Country to the national motorway network. The junction is on the MRN and therefore it is a crucial node in the Black Country and West Midlands transport network of importance to both commuters, freight haulage and businesses.
- 4.5 The £1m grant funding will be used as funding towards the cost of this project in 2021/22 and 2022/23. Due to the urgency of the funding agreement needing to be signed, the Strategic Investment Unit has not undertaken an appraisal which under normal circumstances is required as part of the Council's Financial Regulations.

5 Alternative Options

The Birchley Island M5 Junction 2 Scheme will be under-funded if the TCF Grant is not accepted. An alternative would be to make up the shortfall with an additional £1m Capital contribution from the Council.
