1. The purpose of the proposal or decision required (Please provide as much information as possible)



The purpose of the proposal is to recommission the Children's Centre Service for 3 years with an option to extend for a further year.

The service works with families across the borough on a range of issues including family support, early years, welfare rights, health promotion, parenting and steps to training and employment for parents

There will be very limited change to the existing service contract.

#### 2. Evidence used/considered

The proposal is based on the continuation of the current contract specification.

That contract already involves current monitoring returns and quarterly performance review meetings with service providers which give evidence about services provided and the families that utilise services through the existing contracts.

#### 3. Consultation

Parents have been consulted about the experience of bringing up their children in Sandwell as part of the Early Years Transformation Academy work. This exercise has raised issues for all services in the borough. Specific issues have been identified for the Children's Centre Service and are included in the Cabinet Report. The matters will be included in the contract specification.

### 4. Assess likely impact

If the proposal is agreed by Cabinet there would be no major change to existing service delivery. There may be a change of agencies leading on service delivery but the contract specification would be consistent and give assurance of continuity.

The service is already boroughwide with a town-based approach to delivery. The service seeks to reach all families especially in the crucial early years.

Age	<b>✓</b>			The Service would continue to work with children and young people 0-19 years and their families.  An analysis of Family Support cases in Q2 of 2020-21 shows that the 37.2% of cases were children under 5 years of age; 39.5% of cases were children 5-10 years of age; 21.3% were children 11-16 years of age and 2% were young people over 16 years of age.  This data is consistent with the overarching role for Centres in providing Early Help support. The support for older children and young people is led by the COG service in the Children's Trust.  No action is required to be taken.
Disability	<b>✓</b>			The Service provider would continue to work with families with children with disabilities and families where the parent has a disability.



Gender reassignment	✓	The services are borough -wide and are accessible to all children and families.

JSNA figures are given first with children's centre figures in brackets Oldbury 44.5% (42.9%) Rowley 21.8% (26.9%) Smethwick 69.5% (76.9%) Tipton 29.1% (31.8%) Wednesbury 28.9% (21.8%) West Brom 50.2% (52.9%)  The data is reasonably consistent with the data per town. Further investigation will be undertaken in relation to Wednesbury which falls 7% behind the expected rate.

		Analysis of the take-up of services across the 6 towns shows that there are a greater number of boys taking up services compared to girls. The percentage of boys ranges from 50.5% (Rowley) to 57.7% (Wednesbury). Unfortunately the 0-5 years JSNA 2020 does not provide a baseline figure for the borough in respect of gender.
		This is not highlighting a major issue but the children's centre in each town will be tasked to undertake further work to establish any patterns in the take-up of services between boys and girls.
