Economic vulnerabilities



- Sandwell currently has the lowest gross disposable household income (GDHI) per head in West Midlands at £13,359; at 0.11 per thousand rate is the lowest number of high-growth firms per population in the West Midlands.
- The centre for progressive policy has predicted a productivity drop of 36% of gross value added in Sandwell during quarter 2 of 2020
- Research suggests that places with higher entrepreneurial activity recovered faster after the 2008 crisis. This makes the case for business support in Sandwell even stronger during downturns.
- The Federation of Small Businesses in the UK expects some 25% of SME businesses to close in 2020.
- 6.8% of people (16-64) in Sandwell are self-employed -around 13,818 people, and the self-employed are particularly vulnerable group within the crisis

SBRR and Retail Leisure & Hospitality co-vid grants

- Support for applicants, business engagement, publicity, public enquiries
- £51.2 million through Revenues and Benefits Team totalling 4549 grants
- 1154 businesses contacted through outreach (grants exercise) to offer financial support

Discretionary Grants for Business

- Max £3.36 million, section 30 money (Department of Business Energy & Industrial Strategy)
- 103 organisations , £843,000, £8,184 average grant to date by 22/06/20

AIM for Gold project (ERDF) adapted to co-vid

 Tailored project provision to meet operational delivery or staff skills needs: i.e. co-vid workplace configuration work, reaching new markets, new product diversification, new machinery. Grants of £15k capital or 8K revenue to support business development, subject to a high financial intervention rate of 70% set by DHCLG.

Reopening High Streets Safely Fund (ERDF)

Value £292,628. For supporting activity taking place between 1st June 2020 and 31st March 2021. 4% Admin support costs. Will be used to strengthen Sandwell Council communications and publicity around hygiene and social distancing, also offering more consistent messaging and safety advice to business and consumers ongoing.

Emerging trends



- Spike in redundancies has not hit yet Unemployment count increase, redundancy forecasts, furlough employer contributions
- **Disproportionate impact on young people** lack of apprenticeship vacancies, University options, unstable employment
- Impact on those 50 plus as with other Economic crisis it is forecast people aged 50 plus will be disproportionately impacted
- Skills and employment support demand will be different higher skilled cohort, more disadvantaged move further away from the labour market
- **Digital exclusion** still a major barrier for residents to complete training/upskill
- Mental health anxiety for those returning to work or accessing the labour market
