1/19 **Minutes**

Resolved that the minutes of the meeting held on 11th December, 2018 be confirmed as a correct record.

2/19 **Building Community Wealth – Preparation for Visit to Preston City Council**

Further to Minute No. 10/18, the Chair and Councillor Ali provided the Select Committee with feedback from their visit to Preston City Council to discuss its work on Community Wealth Building with the Leader of Preston and its Deputy Chief Executive.

Following the financial market crash of 2008, and the programme of austerity that had been employed by Governments since that time, there had been little sign nationally of improvement in living standards and inequality continued to rise. Investment and productivity in the country remained weak and macro-economic approaches were not felt to be addressing the problems that were impacting on places and local communities.

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In Preston, in 2011, the £700m Tithebarn Regeneration Scheme was abandoned which highlighted the need to the City Council to consider a different approach; Community Wealth Building. While originally developed in America, Preston City Council took the concepts and values of Community Wealth Building and developed what was known as 'the Preston Model'.

Key elements of the approach in Preston included:-

- An Anchor Institution Strategy where large place-based institutions in Preston and Lancashire increased spending with local suppliers to benefit the local community.
- The Local Government Pension Fund that covered Preston had been encouraged to make place-based investment in the city which included student accommodation, a hotel and office space.
- Expanding co-operative and employee-owned businesses through a Co-operative Development Network.
- Seeking to establish the Lancashire Community Bank, and supporting credit unions.
- Creating, in partnership with another local authority, an energy supplier for the region.
- Planning policies encouraging locally based suppliers and labour in both public and private sector developments.
- Working with the University of Central Lancashire and other partners in establishing a Civic Drone Centre, exploring how the community could benefit from new drone supply chains and clusters.

The Preston Model, with a small investment, had enabled the anchor institutions to spend almost all of their procurement of supplies and services either within Preston or Lancashire. This had resulted in approximately £600m being spent more locally, with all the benefits that generated including stimulating the local economy, creating employment opportunities and strengthening local communities.

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It was reported that as a result of the improvements brought about by the adoption of Community Wealth Building, Preston had been named as the most improved city in the UK. Increases in multiple key index measures for Preston were out-performing the index average, this included jobs, work-life balance, skills and income distribution.

The Chair reported that Community Wealth Building was also being considered in other local authorities, most locally in Birmingham and Dudley. The Select Committee felt that Community Wealth Building, as a proven model of strengthening the local economy, held opportunities for Sandwell and agreed to recommend to the Leader that it should be further explored for adoption in the borough.

The Select Committee agreed that Community Wealth Building could strongly complement and help achieve the Council's existing ambitions in Vision 2030 and its inclusive growth agenda.

Resolved:-

- (1) that the Leader of the Council be recommended to consider Community Wealth Building for development and introduction in Sandwell to support Vision 2030 and the inclusive growth agenda;
- (2) that, subject to (1) above, the Leader of the Council be recommended to consider the establishment of a Commission to carry out the further development of Community Wealth Building in Sandwell.
