

# Children's Services and Education Scrutiny Board

The Children's Service and Education Board is part of the scrutiny function in Sandwell. It has overall responsibility for the scrutiny of a range of matters including services for children's social care, children and family services and education. The scrutiny board is an advisory body, and therefore does not engage in decision making.

#### **RESTRICTIONS ON SITTING:**

All Councillors, except members of the Cabinet, can sit on scrutiny boards.

## NUMBER OF MEMBERS REQUIRED:

11 elected members, c-opted members representing parent governors of maintained schools, as well as a Church of England Diocesan representative and a Roman Catholic Archdiocesan representative. The quorum is equal to one quarter of the total number of voting members.

#### FREQUENCY OF MEETINGS:

Six Board meetings per year on average. Working groups and inquiry sessions may also be established by the Board.

## **USUAL TIME OF DAY / LENGTH:**

Evening - 6.00-8.00pm

#### **FURTHER DETAILS:**

Can initiate working groups, inquiry sessions and site visits to carry out in-depth scrutiny of an issue. Helpful to have an interest or experience in matters considered by the board. Skills and experience useful (ex-teachers/child social care experience)
