

Safer Neighbourhoods and Active Communities Scrutiny Board

The Safer Neighbourhoods and Active Communities Scrutiny Board is part of the scrutiny function in Sandwell. It has overall responsibility for the scrutiny of a range of matters including crime, anti-social behavior, housing, leisure, parks and community services. It is also the Council's designated crime and disorder committee as required by the Police and Justice Act 2006. The scrutiny board is an advisory body, and therefore does not engage in decision making.

RESTRICTIONS ON SITTING:

All Councillors, except members of the Cabinet, can sit on scrutiny boards.

NUMBER OF MEMBERS REQUIRED:

11 elected members and a co-opted member representing the Tenant and Leaseholder Scrutiny Group. The quorum of the Board is three voting Members.

FREQUENCY OF MEETINGS:

Six Board meetings per year on average. Working groups and inquiry sessions may also be established by the Board.

USUAL TIME OF DAY / LENGTH:

Evening meetings – 5.45-7.45pm.

FURTHER DETAILS:

Can initiate working groups, inquiry sessions and site visits to carry out in-depth scrutiny of an issue. Helpful to have an interest or experience in matters considered by the board.
